

# Welcome to **HarborArts** *Outdoor Gallery*

East Boston, MA is the site of the first outdoor public art exhibition launched by **HarborArts**, made possible by Coastal Marine Management and organized in partnership with the Urban Arts Institute of Massachusetts College of Art and Design. Set within the grounds and on the docks of the historic Boston Harbor Shipyard & Marina, the gallery opens with a collection of more than 25 contemporary artworks by well-known and emerging artists in a variety of styles and media, sculptures and paintings as well as performance pieces. All art exhibited at the shipyard is on loan from the artists. Individual pieces will be on display for public viewing lasting a period of several months to several years, with new additions to the collection installed seasonally.

**HarborArts** has dedicated this Gallery to the member organizations of the Massachusetts Ocean Coalition. Gallery signs were designed to give visitors a better understanding of and appreciation for organizations doing real work towards environmental stewardship of our water resources.

**HarborArts** is a global community bringing people together to champion the vital role our oceans, waterways and harbors play in the future of our planet.

**HarborArts** uses public art displays and our web site HarborArts.net to bring attention to issues and solutions that affect the quality of our harbors, waterways and oceans. We

Massachusetts' 1500 miles of coastline and its 1.6 million acres of subtidal lands are an integral part of New England's ocean waters. They belong to all of us, yet they face a tidal wave of proposed new uses. In order to protect these important natural resources and guide all development activity, including renewable energy, the Commonwealth has released the first-in-the nation Massachusetts Ocean Management Plan. This landmark ocean management plan is designed to end decades of ad hoc decision making by establishing a coordinated plan that seeks to balance economic growth with protection of marine wildlife and habitat.

The Massachusetts Ocean Coalition represents over 40 member organizations that worked together to build the comprehensive Massachusetts Ocean Plan that balances commercial and recreational activities with conservation needs; ensuring a healthy ocean legacy for the Bay State.
